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North Forty News Website Surpasses 2 Million Visits, **Publisher** Reports **Exponential** Growth

The North Forty News website reached 2 Million unique visits in March 2022. Publisher, Blaine Howerton took over ownership of the newspaper in June of 2017, when the traffic was at 4,855 visits per month. In March 2022, the average was 4,800 visits a day, with over 100,000 visits recorded at northfortynews.com in a single month. Website records show an estimated 485% increase in average monthly website traffic after 4 years.

In June 2017, North Forty News was a monthly publication with 3,000 copies going out a month. Seeing a demand for more up-to-date and frequently distributed news, Blaine decided to make it a weekly newspaper. So, in June of 2019, North Forty News became a weekly publication. Three years later, in 2022, North Forty News is distributing 8,000 copies of the newspaper per week, an estimated 1,250% increase in printed

In January 2018, North Forty News acquired Scene Magazine and renamed it New SCENE. The 30+ year publication traditionally covered music, arts, theater, and events in Northern Colorado. When

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Backyard Hops

Whether you are a home brewer, are drawn to the ornamental beauty of the plant or just enjoy the fragrance, hops continue to be popular in home and public gardens alike. Hop plants are a great ornamental climber along fences and pergolas, for shade in a sitting area, or as a privacy screen, and the hops cones add a distinctive flavor and aroma to beer and food.

Hops (Humulus lupulus) are perennial plants that die back to the ground in the fall and come up from the crown of the plant each spring. If you're looking to add these to your own landscape,

you can purchase hop varieties as rhizomes (an underground stem that sends out roots and shoots) or as potted plants from local nurseries or home brew stores. Plant your hops in spring after last frost in a sunny spot in welldraining soil that has been amended with compost. Dig the hole twice as wide as the container, water well after planting, and apply a light mulch to keep weeds down and the soil evenly moist. Once established, hops prefer deep, less frequent watering.

Hop plants can grow to lengths of 25 feet or more and weigh 20+ pounds, so they need a sturdy trellis



system to grow on. Space plants far enough apart to keep their side arms from getting tangled with other varieties. Use strong twine as the climbing support for the stems (called bines, not vines). Using a natural and compostable twine makes fall clean up easier.

It is necessary to train your hop plants onto their supporting trellis once they reach two to three years old. After your plant has sprouted in spring, cut the first flush of bines to the ground when they are about a foot tall (but not after May 1st). Once they recover in a few weeks, select three or four of the hardier bines and gently wrap them clockwise around the trellis. Continue to cut untrained hop bines to the ground as they pop up, keeping only the main bines on the trellis. In late spring to early summer, you can apply fertilizer suitable for fruits and vegetables to help provide the nutrients that hops require. Additionally, keeping the bottom three feet of foliage cut off the bines through early summer will help with wind movement through the plant, as well as aid insect and disease control.

If you choose to use your hops for homebrewing, you'll need to check them regularly for ripeness.

They are ready to harvest when they make a papery sound and spring back into shape when pinched between your fingers, usually from mid-August to mid-September, depending on the variety. The lupulin inside the cones will also be bright yellow in color (not light yellow or orange) and have a pungent aroma. Selectively harvest all the cones that are ready from each bine.

GOSC Hops To store hops, thoroughly dry the cones and vacuum seal them in one- to twoounce bags, then freeze. Hops keep for up to two years if air is removed and they stay frozen. Fresh, undried hops should be used within 48 hours.

Hunting and Angling

Hunting and Angling Outreach Programs Help to Get People in the Outdoors

Colorado Parks and Wildlife's (CPW) hunting and angling outreach programs offer clinics and seminars throughout the year to give novice and experienced sportspersons alike opportunities to learn or improve upon their skills.

CPW's hunter outreach programs offered more than 300 mentored hunts across the state in 2021. The program also incorporates sponsoring agency programs that nonprofits can apply for and makes dream hunt licenses available to youth with a life-threatening illness or injury, through sponsoring agencies

On the angling side, CPW hosted well over 100 fishing clinics statewide and helped introduce nearly 3,000 people to the sport of angling. These clinics include warm water, fly fishing, kid's events, and ice fishing. Additionally, CPW distributes around 6,000 free fishing rods across the state annually.

Hunting and angling clinics and seminars are informative and educational, featuring experienced guest speakers and CPW experts, and they offer a setting in which to meet others who share similar interests and goals.

Seminars are generally classroombased and cover specific topics such as Hunting 101 for a variety of species or really any skill set needed to be a safe, ethical and successful hunter.

Clinics are typically more handson and oftentimes take place in the field, at the range, or on the water, sometimes even on the ice. They are usually geared towards fishing, shooting, archery, hunting, or basic outdoor skills. Oftentimes, all the necessary equipment is provided for participants and is free.

"We provide that mentoring and educational aspect to get you started and give you a little bit of confidence so you can get out there on your own safely and effectively," said Pepper Canterbury, hunting and angling outreach coordinator for CPW's Northeast region.

Canterbury last year offered 80 days in the field for both big and small game hunts, many of those coming through CPW's Novice Pheasant Hunter Program (NPHP).

The Novice Pheasant Hunter Program, for adults and youth over the age of 12, supports new hunters, with detailed pheasant hunting knowledge, practical field experience, and quality instruction on a trap range. Students must complete three hours of classroom instruction and one half-day field session to receive an NPHP vehicle

walk-in access (WIA) permit.

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

Business and Personal Property Tax Declaration Deadline Approaches

The deadline for business owners to file a Personal Property Declaration with the Larimer County Assessor's Office is April 15. Still, business owners got some welcome news this year.

On January 1, 2022, the threshold requiring business owners to file a Business Personal Property Declaration Schedule on their personal business property was raised from \$7,900 to the current \$50,000 in market value.

Those businesses with less than \$50,000 in business personal property do not have to file a schedule. The deadline to file a Declaration Schedule for businesses with personal property value higher than \$50,000 is April 15. Business can file their declarations online using the Business Personal Property Larimer County link. About 500 businesses have already used the new online filing tool to file their declarations.

"Thanks to the Colorado Legislature passing HB-21-1312 to help small businesses save in taxes,

and innovations in the Larimer County Assessor's Office, companies filing Business Personal Property above \$50,000 will have a much-simplified process this year," said Assessor Bob Overbeck.

Business Personal Property is defined as equipment used in your business and should be included in a

The Remington Opens for Downtown Seniors Former DMA Plaza Affordable **Housing Gets a New Look**

The board of The Remington, 300 Remington St., has announced its virtual grand opening, which can now be viewed online. "People who were familiar with the old DMA Plaza should be prepared to be amazed," said Mike Sollenberger, board president. "Working together with dozens of community partners, we've modernized this landmark apartment building into a new senior affordable housing community for downtown Fort

This site of the old Remington school was purchased by the Downtown Merchants Association from Poudre School District in April of 1969. After

the school was torn down, the DMA agreed

to sell the under-utilized parking lot to the nonprofit DMA Plaza for \$65,000. In 1973, the 11-story, 70,000-square-foot DMA Plaza opened its doors and helped meet the growing need for senior housing for those on a limited income. "The Remington stands tall and continues to answer that need, including serving those with the very low-income levels of 30% AMI,"

explained Sollenberger.

The exterior got an updated facelift along with new heating, ventilation, lighting, plumbing, electrical, and fire suppression upgrades. The Remington The remodel - designed and executed by

Architecture +, VFLA, and Brinkman Construction - expanded the laundry room as well as added a new fitness center, conference room, and outdoor

The city of Fort Collins provided \$2.5M towards the project through community development block grants; it aligns with the city's affordable housing strategic plan of preserving long-term affordable housing and providing services for the most vulnerable populations - including seniors - explained Beth Rosen, city of Fort Collins department of social sustainability grants and compliance officer. "I'm so excited when I walk into The Remington to see this beautiful building that's

providing long-term housing for local residents," Rosen said. "I'm also excited about the amazing opportunities people have to create beautiful lives."

Susan Kirkpatrick, former Fort Collins Mayor, and downtown business owner has served on The Remington (former DMA Plaza) board for about 10 years. She explained that instead of partnering with other organizations, "The very thoughtful board decided to remain an independent, private not-for-profit; and I think in the long haul, that will be a great benefit to the residents, and to the building itself, as there's more flexibility."

The project also received \$1M from the Colorado Division of Housing. The Colorado Housing

and Finance Authority authorized \$15M in tax credits, which were purchased by Midwest Housing Equity Group which

became an investor in The Remington.

"I want to give a big thank you to our Executive Director, Lori French," said Sollenberger. "She has made herself into a very competent construction person after experience, and she deserves a lot of credit for what we have achieved." Sollenberger also thanks consultant Dan Morgan from DGMA for his invaluable assistance. Karen Weitkunat, also a former

Fort Collins Mayor and board member for over 10 years, said "The former DMA Plaza served the community for almost 50 years as a place that was safe for residents. And the renovations of The Remington now guarantee that the next 50 years will see us have safe, affordable, attainable, and comfortable housing for seniors in the downtown area. What a legacy."

Boyd Lake State Park's Boating Season Is Open

Boyd Lake State Park opened for boating on Friday, March 25. Boyd Lake has two boat ramps for your convenience.

- The main, six-lane boat ramp is located by the marina.
- A two-lane ramp is located further north at Heron Cove, where nonmotorized and personal watercraft can be launched.

Its aquatic nuisance species (ANS) inspection station hours will run from 8 am to 6 pm for the remainder of March, 7 am to 7 pm in April and 6 am to 10 pm from May 1 through Labor Day. It is located in the marina.

The ANS decontamination site at Boyd Lake is available seven days a week from 8 am to 6 pm. Boyd Lake's park office is currently open Wednesday through Sunday, 9 am to 4 pm, and available for boat registrations.

Boyd Lake State Park is a water-sports haven for northern Colorado. The lake lies at the western-most edge of the plains at the foot of snow-capped Long's Peak and the mountains of the Continental Divide.

All types of watercraft (ski boats, fishing boats, jet skis, sailboats, canoes, paddleboards) use Boyd Lake's 1,700 surface acres of water. The current water level at Boyd Lake is 50 feet and

the courtesy dock will be installed by Friday's opening.

Please remember to help protect Colorado's waters and to inspect your boat and safety equipment prior to use.

- CLEAN all mud, plants, or animals from the hull of your boat.
- DRAIN all of the water from the boat, live well, and lower unit of the engine.
- DRY the boat and contents before the next launch.Check for your life jackets and
- other safety equipment.
- Inspect your boat prior to launch.
- Have your boat plugs.

Boyd Lake is a popular spot with both shoreline and boat anglers. It provides quality fishing for walleye, white bass, catfish and trout. Anglers may additionally catch smallmouth bass, crappie, bluegill, and perch.

Sport Fishing Notes:

- Walleye Fish any rock structure when water temps are 45-55°F. Later, fish are scattered but tube jigs, lindy rigs, triple ripples, are good choices.
- White Bass Follow the birds! The white bass will be chasing shad! Use silver Kastmasters or another shad imitation. Often attracted to flows when the reservoir is filling (especially at 40-52°F).
- Largemouth Bass Bass fishing can be frustrating given the limited amount of structure. Try rock rip-rap areas with crayfish imitations.
- Channel Catfish Best baits are cut shad or chicken liver. Night fishing is best.

Wide-Eyed Wonder: Dave Grohl's Rocking Stories

Witness the risks and rewards of devoting your life to rock and roll -- according to Dave Grohl. That's Dave Grohl of Foo Fighters. That's Dave Grohl, "that guy from Nirvana". That's Dave Grohl, "author"?

Yes, Grohl recently published a book — "The Storyteller" — bringing together a lot of his fondest memories from a life that started with humble beginnings as a suburban teenager in Virginia and blazed toward international rock stardom.

In "The Storyteller", the risks of devoting your life to rock and roll are many including chronic substance abuse, malnutrition, lack of sleep, overcaffeination, and bodily harm at the hands of fans, junkies, and various enemies.

The rewards, for Grohl at least, have also been many, like meeting lifelong musical idols like Little Richard, Paul McCartney, and the band AC/DC; playing with Tom Petty and the Heartbreakers, John Paul Jones of Led Zeppelin, Josh Homme of Queens of the Stone Age, and so many more.

There seems to be money too.

What comes through it all, though, is a love for music, music, music. A wide-eyed wonder of music permeates the entirety of "The Storyteller" with all its power to reach the fans and propel the musicians. Grohl loved rock and roll before he became a musician and it only became deeper when he waded into the middle of it.

I can relate. So can a lot of people. And that's what initially makes Grohl an "everyman" -- struggling to survive while staying true to his art by being willing to forgo the relative security of "regular" life to make it happen.

In the book, Grohl details his early years with DC punk band Scream and this is fascinating stuff -- stories that thousands of other rock and roll musicians could totally relate to.

I'm talking about guys going on the road, sleeping in their van, living off of pennies, and blasting to gigs all over the country -- and beyond.

Scream was part of a network of

bands that played far and wide on a do-it-yourself basis. It wasn't business; it was a radical alternative lifestyle. They didn't make any real money, but they rocked

and rocked some more.

By happenstance, just by being in the right place at the right time, Grohl even

got to meet a hero -- punk godfather Iggy Pop -- and play a gig with him long before any kind of widespread stardom.

But after leaving Scream and living

doing. These are not "everyman" experiences, despite Grohl's insistence that he can't believe his good fortune either.

"The Storyteller" drops plenty of famous names throughout and you have to cheer him on for this -- I wouldn't mind going over to Neil Young's house for dinner or jamming with Joan Jett -- positive attitude.

In "The Storyteller", every step of the way is the best thing that ever happened to him. As he grows, so does his definition of success, and, apparently, what has come to him has far outstripped his dreams all along the way.

Finally, you have to wonder where else this rock and roll ride can take him.

Grohl has already experienced a couple more of the risks and rewards of rock and roll since publishing "The Storyteller".

One of the rewards has been getting to shoot and star in his own horror movie. In February, Foo Fighters released "Studio 666", a blood-soaked comedy about haunted houses and murdered musicians.

Risks? The horrible news that Grohl's longtime Foo Fighters bandmate and buddy, drummer Taylor Hawkins, someone Grohl describes as a "brother from another mother", died on March 25, just prior to a massive gig in Bogota.

In "The Storyteller", Grohl writes extensively about loss and grief. He expresses the deep hurt he felt losing Nirvana bandmate Kurt Cobain to suicide. That same hurt returned with the passing of his closest childhood friend, Jimmy

The news about Hawkins has probably hit Grohl real hard. And like a lot of the stories in his book, the stakes are high for him in 2022. Foo Fighters had just started touring again and they were scheduled for a Denver date at Empower Field at Mile High on August 6. However, the band has canceled all of their upcoming tour dates.

Despite this current loss, if Grohl is true to what he says in "The Storyteller", he will find a way to someday rock again — not because it's a good business decision, but rather because he just has to.

through the killer storm that was Nirvana -- going from three corn dogs-a-day poverty to crushing stardom in a relatively short amount of time -- things change for Grohl.

As a survivor of intense fame and someone who continued to carry on the never-ending quest to make good rock and roll by founding Foo Fighters, he apparently earned a place at the table.

When he starts talking about playing Saturday Night Live in Tom Petty's band, he turns from an "everyman" to a "special man". He gets to play for President Obama, he gets to play at the Academy Awards, he gets to rock out in front of stadiums full of fans on a regular basis.

These aren't things that regular people get to do or even imagine themselves

but again, these are "special man" perks.

Grohl also gets real personal with his stories too. Despite the salty rock and roll language, there are quite a few "Hallmark" moments throughout the book. In particular, he often takes the opportunity to profess his love for his mother and for his children.


The personal stuff does get a little heavy-handed at times. I'll admit, I almost closed the book on the chapter about his first middle school crush, even though it ended up with every jilted teenager boy's dream — to someday "show up" that girl who walked away.

Beyond those things, though, what's inspiring here is just the eternal presence of rock and roll — the wide-eyed eternal presence — and Grohl meets it with a









BAND W.I.T.C.H. AND SANDWICH SCORE BIG AT THE LYRIC

I obviously don't know any of you personally, but I'm willing to assume that within your lives you've enjoyed a grilled cheese sandwich a time or two, am I right? It's a pretty ingenious concept: toasted bread with melted cheese in the middle doesn't get much better than that...or does it?!

I was at The Lyric on Tuesday, March 22 for the much-anticipated performance of W.I.T.C.H., with special guests Holy Wave and Night Beats, and at some point, within the evening it became clear to me that I may or may not have had too much to drink. Now at any other venue that might have become a problem, but one of the many great things about the Lyric is they sell AND serve food for all of those people like me who are still learning how to drink alcohol.

They have a lot on their menu but truly, the only thing that really matters is their world-famous grilled cheese with bacon. I can't prove the Lyric is the first to think of adding bacon to a grilled cheese but they're certainly carrying on the tradition with great pride and success. It's a mystical sandwich that, if sober, might just taste like an ordinary run-of-the-mill sandwich, but if you're intoxicated it becomes magically delicious! Honestly, I think police officers should be required to carry grilled cheese sandwiches with bacon in their squad cars and try handing those out instead of tickets...just a thought, I'm not running for office or anything.

But alas, it would be quite remiss of me to not get into the actual concert that took place that night as it was quite the evening for music, not just sandwiches. The opening act was Austin, Texas-based Holy Wave, and – crap, they were really good. Not just because of the easy setup for a pun, they were actually really good! With dreamy reverb distortion mixed in with an undeniable garage rock vibe, these guys were hard not to pay attention to, which is saying a lot for an opening act. Their latest album 'Interloper' (released in 2020) has been on my Spotify list for over a week now and I strongly encourage you to give them

a shot!

The middle band Night Beats, who have actually been touring alongside W.I.T.C.H., wasted no time taking the stage and letting their presence be known. Originally based out of Seattle, Washington, Night Beats is the sole creation of Texas native Danny Lee Blackwell, and much like their Texas counterparts Holy Wave, they, too, were proficient in the blending of psychedelic R&B with acid-fried rock 'n roll. Their latest album 'Outlaw R&B' was released in June 2021 and it still continues to melt the ears of those brave enough to listen to it.

Lastly, we come to the main event, W.I.T.C.H. (We Intend to Cause Havoc). Aside from immense talent, this band has immense history, as well; initially formed in Zambia in the 1970s, they quickly rose to fame and are still widely considered the most popular Zambian band to come from that era. They found a new popularity in 2012 after reissues of their albums started to resurface abroad; headed by lead vocalist Emanuel "Jagari" Chanda, this band has without a doubt seen more members come and go than perhaps Spinal Tap, however, as of 2013 Chanda has been touring steadily with 80's keyboardist Patrick Mwondela, along with an all-new lineup, but still with that same great Zamrock sound.

To simply label them as a "psych-rock" band doesn't do them justice, but it's a genre they've without a doubt helped to define and carry on. Chanda has a presence on stage that's both captivating and contagious, as it's nearly impossible to not get lost in dancing madly as he leads by example. W.I.T.C.H. is out touring the planet right now, but that doesn't mean you have to wait for their return before catching up on their entire library, past to present, on Bandcamp or Spotify.





Rock On!

A Tribute to Norm Miller and Those Who Help Keep Whale Rock Alive

Who knew a painted rock could and would become such a popular topic?! Why, if I didn't know any better, I'd say this rock is almost more popular than the other 'Rock' that just got slapped at the Oscars! First and foremost, I feel it's important to get a certain specific detail covered before getting too far into the new information I've been given regarding Whale Rock; North Forty had printed a Photo of the Week and the photo featured Bellvue Bluff Dome but it was incorrectly labeled as Whale Rock. Well, obviously, that's not correct and so I just want to be perfectly clear that it was a mistake on our part and Bellvue Dome and Whale Rock have absolutely nothing to do with

Now then, as for who has taken up the mantle of painting Whale Rock after Polly Brinkhoff's passing, I have to make yet another correction by admitting I was wrong in speculating it was Polly's lingering spirit continuing on with her artistic endeavors...turns out it was just other people. The (unofficial) Mayor of Bellvue Judy Jackson was able to get me in touch with Larry and Barbara Monesson who then shared with me that it was Barbara and their son Cal who were at least responsible for painting the rock one time within the last six years.

"We tried to get rid of the graffiti and

and Horsetooth Reservoir that a lot of us have, but the people were friendly and they were clannish, they sort of stuck together and had their opinions[...]We all sort of took a bit of pride in that because we didn't really want people crawling all over the land."

But that's hardly the end of the story; as they say, the plot thickens! In addition to speaking with Barbara, I was also able to speak with Richard Lund, a 31-year resident of Rist Canyon and Treasurer for their Fire Department, and he informed me that Norman Hollis Miller had taken the reigns of painting the rock on at least two separate occasions from the time of Polly's passing in '99.

"Norm Miller, he was a firefighter up here, he's the one that picked up the painting of the rock. Right now, the rock has not been painted since he painted it, he was the last one to do it and the paint is starting to fade away, I'm just not exactly sure how long ago that was, it's been at least a few years," said Richard. "I'm not sure if Norm and Polly knew each other or not, but what had happened was the rock got in such poor shape, as far as painting and so forth, and that's when he (Norm) stepped in and felt that he needed do something about it. He was a really great guy."

Known to many as Stormin' Norman,

sustained in a tragic accident at his home.

Norm was a proud fireman and EMT with the Rist Canyon Volunteer Fire Department from 2004 through 2020.

He fought during High Park and Cameron Peak wildfires in recent years and kept the department's fire trucks and equipment repaired and ready for action.

"I knew Norm well, I've been in the fire department for thirty-four years now, so Just a word to the wise for any of you artistic folks that might be reading this and feel inspired to add your creative two cents to the rock, Barbara says the Rist Canyon community would like to carry on the tradition for themselves.

"We would prefer to leave it in our hands, we just wish people wouldn't graffiti it at all or any of the other rocks within Rist Canyon. Norm would actually

keep it off as much as we could, so far it's been pretty successful; it just requires a can of similar color or same color paint and the motivation to get down there and crawl around in the weeds and shrubs to get it done," Barbara said. "Polly Brinkhoff painted lots of rocks in Rist Canyon and it's sad that she passed, but the history of Rist Canyon, we have lot of history up here[...]it's sad that the people who have helped create all of this history have pretty much passed on now; Judy Jackson has a wealth of information stored in her head and on paper[...]Larry and I have been here (in the canyon) for forty-something years now and we've met and known a lot of those people."

Seeing how Polly was such a prolific artist and was well known for having painted many rocks, pianos and you name it within Rist Canyon, I asked Barbara why she thought Whale Rock specifically became so popular.

"I think a lot had to do with the early reputation of Whale Rock Road, there were some pretty great characters that actually lived many years ago on this rock; it was just a really interesting place when we came here and we loved it, not so much just because of the view of Fort Collins

he retired from the fire department last fall and moved to Fort Collins, however, on January 29 of this year he unexpectedly passed at the age of 86, from injuries

Norm was a good friend of mine and we're all certainly really sorry that he had that accident; we miss him and will continue to," said Larry Monesson.

scrub the paint off of the main rocks in Rist Canyon when he saw them and leave them back in as much of a natural state

as he could," Barbara said.

In fact, Barbara told me that her son Cal had recently suggested that they go back down and pay Whale Rock another visit to scrape off the eroding blue paint and spruce it up a little bit, so I think it's safe to say that the legacy is in good hands, thus, honoring the spirits of both Polly and Norm, two staple characters of Rist Canyon that much like the paint on the rock, won't ever fade away.

Norm is survived by his wife Joan, daughter Lynn Miller and grandchildren Avery, Hayden, and Chloe; daughter Diane Davis (Mike) and grandchildren Megan, Melissa, Maia, and Nadia; and his sister Kathy Converse (Randy) of Madison, Wisconsin, and many nieces and nephews.

If you knew Stormin' Norman personally, Richard let me know that they have a memorial planned for June 5 at the Anheuser Busch Biergarten Event Center in Fort Collins from 1 pm to 5 pm,
