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#### Letter to the Editor: Bill in Colorado Senate Will Cost You and Your **Election Integrity**

It is extremely rare for me to reach out to citizens in an effort to ask for action regarding legislation that is being contemplated in the legislature. Unfortunately, I am compelled to do so today because of a late bill just introduced in the Senate - SB22-230 Collective Bargaining for Counties. This bill essentially opens county government up for unionization. I believe it has the potential to be the biggest threat to election integrity I have encountered during my 20 years in the clerk's office. Whether it includes binding arbitration and the right to strike or not, it potentially puts a powerful middleman where no middleman should be.

Please be aware that this bill was originally drafted to include special districts, school districts and municipalities. However, by the time it was introduced, it included only county government. Why? I would encourage every citizen to learn about the arguments made by the other entities that got themselves removed. I am especially curious about the removal of school districts - would they not have the most exposure to collective bargaining and, therefore, embrace it?

County government is arguably the most operationally efficient and effective in the

state and, I believe, the nation. Personally, (See "Election Integrity" on page 14)

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## 10 Perennials in Bloom in May

Here's an experience most avid gardeners can probably relate to: you're enjoying a nice cup of tea or coffee on a summer morning, looking out into your beautiful yard and you realize nothing is blooming. The most successful perennial gardens have something blooming all the time, but this isn't as easy as it sounds! There are some heavy hitters like Rozanne Geranium, Whirling Butterflies and perennial violas that bloom all summer, but most plants don't. Plan your planting accordingly to get flowers all summer long, as well as supplying food for pollinators, hummingbirds and birds. Some perennials thrive in the cooler weather like lupine, peonies or bleeding hearts while others crave that intense heat like helianthus, hibiscus and sedum.

Here is a great list of 10 perennials that are blooming in May as well as brief descriptions of each plant. Another technique to have color and interest through the season is utilizing leaf texture and color. Incorporate red or chartreuse leafed perennials throughout your garden to draw the eye through. Add pops of color when your other plants are not blooming.

**Peonies**- There are three types of peonies: Itohs, herbaceous and tree peonies. Itohs are hybrids between herbaceous and tree peonies, with sturdy stems and large uniquely colored flowers. They come in yellow, apricot, pink and lilac. The herbaceous peonies are smaller and come in the more traditional shades of pink, red, and white. Tree peonies are much slower growing, usually in purple, pink or red.



- 2. Dianthus Dianthus comes in many shades of red and pink and smell amazing, too. The flowers can be large with many petals, or small and delicate. They also come in a range of sizes, from low-growing groundcovers to two-foot tall specimens.
- 3. Iris- These come in a rainbow of colors and sizes, some varieties bloom twice. The variegated form has purple flowers that smell like grape kool-aid!
- Pasque Flowers- Hairy, nodding flowers that will catch the early morning dew. An invaluable source of early-season food for honeybees and native bees.
- Rocky Mountain Columbine- The large, blue and white spurred flowers are nice for floral arrangements. A native flower that hummingbird and hawk moths love.
- Perennial Violas Workhorses in the garden, they bloom May through fall frost and come in a range of colors. They also reseed. Chatahoochee Phlox- A groundcover Phlox
- with fragrant, light-blue lavender flowers with a darker center. 8. Prairie Smoke Geum- Delicate nodding
- flowers with attractive fluffy seed heads, like clematis. Native and low water. Bonfire Euphorbia- Beautiful spring bloomer with striking burgundy foliage
- and sulfur yellow flowers. 10. Lupine- Tall spires of pea-shaped flowers, the native is blue but many cultivars come in a range of colors.

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






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

## **Getting to Know** Fort Collins Mayor Jeni Arndt, in Her Own Words

NORTH FORTY: First off, can you tell us a little about your personal interests?

JENI: I always say my personal interests are running, swimming, biking, and talking to people. Also, I suppose reading and knitting are two other

NORTH FORTY: If you had the perfect forum to get messages across to the residents and the region, what would that look like for you?

JENI: I would like a publicly owned newspaper. I'm a big fan of locally owned newspapers[...] we don't have a community bulletin anymore. I'm interested in how we go about having a trusted, non-biased source of information that communicates to the residents, that's reliable and consistent and accurate because, in the long run, that's what helps everyone[...]My fundamental thing is communities should be designed by the people who live in them, the elections should be the highest number of people participating as possible, and that's how you get the community to reflect what the community wants.

NORTH FORTY: What made you initially decide to run for mayor of Fort Collins?

JENI: It was an open seat and frankly I was getting phone calls across the political spectrum asking if I would run for mayor. I saw a chance to keep Fort Collins on track in terms of not going the way a lot of other places have gone in terms of being super ideological and having a split in our community. That piqued my interest and I thought I wonder if we could do it that way because that's a good goal. Honestly, that's what got me thinking about it. If I had gotten calls just from one party, that's not as intriguing to me in terms of how you govern a city; governing a city shouldn't be ideological in nature, so when I started getting calls from former mayors asking if I would consider running, I thought, 'Wow, we can really do this together.' I think (with me) people saw fundamental fairness or willingness to listen and see all sides of an issue; as Jacy Marmaduke (of the Coloradoan) said to me the other day, 'you always go for the unsexy sort of nuts-and-bolts approach to help things just go better.' I told her, 'well, thank you for recognizing that because yeah, that's what I do.' I think people notice and appreciate that fact; I was surprised and flattered that they noticed that, but it's true.

NORTH FORTY: What are some of the key issues that you've been passionate about since your time serving in office?

JENI: I mean this totally sincerely: my issues are the issues of the people. Everyone asks, 'what's your agenda' and I tell them my agenda is yours and I mean it. That's service, it's not about me. Personally, because I was a special education teacher and professor, I'm very emphatic about full inclusion, so when we talk about diversity, equity and inclusion, people always jump right to race and that's certainly a part of it, but I'm very passionate about people with disabilities; that would be the only personal issue I would bring to the table.

NORTH FORTY: Any plans of running for another

JENI: Yes, absolutely, I am intending to run again next term.

NORTH FORTY: Lastly, is there anything else you'd like to say to the public?

JENI: People can just call me; a little girl came from Dunn (Elementary IB World School) to shadow me for an afternoon and then went and reported to her student council and they asked her, 'how did you get in touch with the mayor' and she told them, 'I called her.' People can just call me; government is open, and everyone is welcome anytime.

## **Mental Health Awareness Month** Offers Opportunity to Eliminate Stigma

Since I started my career 30+ years ago, fighting stigma has been at the forefront of the work we do as behavioral healthcare professionals. As our communities have faced so many recent crises including suicides, the opioid epidemic,

## 2 Out of 3 Women with Depression or Anxiety Say They've Reached Their "Breaking Point" Yet More than Half Wait a Year Before Seeking Treatment

Two out of three women diagnosed with depression or anxiety say they have reached or are approaching their breaking point regarding their mental health, according to the GeneSight® Mental Health Monitor, a new nationwide survey

from Myriad Genetics, Inc. (NASDAQ: MYGN). This breaking point can be defined as a negative impact or a significant strain on anything from social life to caring for loved ones at home to professional obligations. Four out

of 10 women without a diagnosis of depression or anxiety say they have reached or are reaching

When feeling overwhelmed, nearly three in four (72%) of women say they "just need to take a break," with 31% believing "I need to try harder." Only 13% said they thought "I should see a doctor" when feeling overwhelmed.

"Women often feel pressure to 'hold it all together' and not admit when they are struggling," says Dr. Betty Jo "BJ" Fancher, family medicine and psychiatric physician assistant with a doctorate of medical science and a master's in psychopharmacology. "Yet, if you are sobbing on the floor of your shower, throwing things in anger, or repeatedly screaming into a pillow, these are signals that you have crossed a line and should see a healthcare provider about your mental health." Delaying mental health treatment is common

among the women surveyed. In fact, more than half (51%) of women diagnosed with anxiety and/or depression waited at least one year before seeking treatment - or never sought treatment at all.

"It is critical to receive treatment for mental

health because we know that mental health conditions are highly comorbid with other physical diseases, such as cancer, stroke, and heart disease. Why live with a mental health condition that can impact every aspect of your life until you reach a breaking point," said Rachael Earls, Ph.D., a

medical science liaison with Myriad Genetics.

According to the survey, the top reasons women diagnosed with depression or anxiety delayed treatment are:

"I thought it was 'just a phase' or that I could get over it on my own" (60%)

"I didn't want anyone to know I was struggling"

- "I didn't want to take medication" (31%)
- "I couldn't afford treatment" (26%)
- "I didn't have health insurance" (19%) "I didn't have time to seek treatment" (18%)

The GeneSight Mental Health Monitor is a nationwide survey of U.S. adults conducted online by ACUPOLL Precision Research, Inc. from Feb. 25 to March 11, 2022, among a statistically representative sample (n=1000) of adults age 18+. The margin of error for the total base

population at a 95% confidence interval is +/- 3%.

McWhinney and Mountain Cowboy Brewing Co have announced the opening of Mountain Cowboy's Loveland location, situated within Centerra's new Kinston Hub.

The original Mountain Cowboy, which opened in Frederick in 2017, is known for drawing the community together, whether its guests gather for conversation over freshly roasted coffee Friday mornings or music enthusiasts congregating over cold beers during open mic night. For both locations, they roast their own coffee beans and grow their own hops for brewing. In honor of their newest taproom, they created Kinston Kolsch, a beer that will be served exclusively at the Kinston Hub.

thrilled to be opening a second location in northern Colorado, especially since we are Loveland residents," said Ron Yovich.

"We are excited for the community to develop around us; we've been fortunate to influence the design of this new space to create a warm, inviting place for everyone to gather. We hope local residents and guests will come to enjoy and fall in love with our crafted beer, freshly roasted coffee, handmade baked goods, and delicious snacks, and come to think of us as one of their top community go-to spots where everyone is welcome."

Kinston is McWhinney's newest residential village, located on 625 acres on the east side of I-25 within Centerra's award-winning master-planned community in Loveland.

At full buildout, Kinston plans to deliver an estimated 2,800 homes oriented around parks and trails to help support the growing demand for northern Colorado residents.

Kinston's first phase of amenities includes outdoor lounge areas, a splash pad, fire pits, demonstration gardens, and interactive art.

Single-family model homes are slated to open in summer of 2022 starting in the \$500,000s. Kinston Commons, which will be the central amenity campus in phase two, is planned to include a fitness/yoga studio, a swimming pool, and an outdoor amphitheater.

## **Not Just Laundry: Rocking Tour Shirts**

In honor of the official return of t-shirt weather -- and the roaring return of Colorado concerts -- I'd like to pay tribute to a true rock and roll tradition: the tour

It's usually black. It has a band name on it. There's usually some very striking artwork splashed across it. A lot of times, the tour dates are on the back too.

And they are a sign of just how cool

Why? Because tour shirts express what kind of music you really dig -- and signal that you were willing to get out there and see your favorite bands play live.

Tour shirts are more than just product branding, though "branding" is certainly a part of it. But more, they are about a time and a place -- rock and roll memories are what make tour shirts more than just

They become the history of good concerts and great times.

I bought my first tour shirt in 1975 at a Rolling Stones show. That was the year the Stones played in Fort Collins at Hughes Stadium. However, I flew into Los Angeles to see them on two consecutive nights at the "Fabulous" Forum.

A friend from Phoenix -- not a city on the Stones tour -- asked me to buy him a t-shirt and since I was doing so, I bought one for myself. I wore that thing constantly, though I probably wouldn't fit into it now. Still, this old thing isn't going in the rag bin.

Since then, I have hardly ever failed to at least check out the merch booth. And once you're there, you may as well buy something, right?

Actually, before I bought any tour shirts, I was buying programs. I bought a fullcolor program at my very first concert overall -- Herb Alpert and the Tijuana Brass in Phoenix in 1966.

My favorite program of all time, though, was the one from the 1974 George Harrison tour with Ravi Shankar, which included a full tutorial on Indian music and instruments. I saw the show in Tucson and since Harrison was the first Beatle I got to see live, I still have that program.

There are other great rock and roll collectibles as well. Band buttons were especially popular in the 1970s and 80s -- and a relatively inexpensive souvenir.

My first buttons were free. When I saw T. Rex in Santa Monica in 1972, they were handing out buttons to promote "The Slider" album. When I saw Blondie in 1978 at the Starwood, the famous punk club in LA, they were handing out buttons that said "Blondie is a Group" signifying that vocalist Deborah Harry wasn't the only one in the band.

Most recently, I just had to buy a UK Subs button when the venerable punk band made a stop in Fort Collins at Hodi's.

Of course, there are also posters, but I was never very interested in them -they are just too hard to carry around during the show without messing them up. But the coolest poster that I did buy was a custom piece of art for a run by The Dead at Red Rocks one year -- a skeleton cowboy riding a bucking bronco.

Stickers? I have a David Lindley and El Rayo X sticker I picked up after a particularly raucous show out at Fort Ram. I have a few patches too, like the one I bought in Las Vegas to commemorate a wild show featuring Nine Inch Nails, Marilyn Manson, and the Jim Rose Circus, perhaps one of the rawest concerts I've ever seen.


I even snagged a Bob Dylan bandana at his most recent appearance at Red Rocks.

But tour shirts are the coolest rock and roll memorabilia of them all -- and I'll bet the 2022 tour shirts will be hot items.


As stated, it's about the memories, but it's also about the artwork. Some shirts are just striking -- like the scary-looking Godsmack shirt I bought at Red Rocks. And some are even shocking -- like the bloody Gwar shirt, I collected at the Aggie

Some of the shirts are folk art. My favorite t-shirt design of all time is one by Johnny Clegg and Savuka. The artwork shows a music party in full gear with a colorful and diverse number of characters

But I noticed when I was looking through my collection of tour shirts recently that there were some shirts missing, notably a U-2 shirt I bought at McNichols Arena on St. Patrick's Day in



First tour shirt Rolling Stones 1975




Favorite design Johnny Clegg and Savuka

1985; and the Bruce Springsteen shirt I bought, also in 1985, at Mile High Stadium, the venue packed to the brim with Bruce fans despite volatile Colorado weather; and The Pretenders shirt I bought at Red Rocks one glorious afternoon.

Oh, that's right, I can remember seeing my daughter wearing them around at one point -- and those vintage shirts were never to be seen again.

The last tour shirt I bought was at the same place I bought the first one -- at the Forum in Los Angeles. It was Black Sabbath's farewell tour and I couldn't NOT get a shirt.

It was a special date for me and my brother. We had seen Sabbath open for

Grand Funk Railroad at the Forum in 1971 -- their first major LA appearance -- and here we were, 45 years later, seeing the band again in all their dark glory.

But wait -- I may not be done. I just bought a ticket to see Alice Cooper at the Budweiser Events Center in October. Hmmm, I don't have an Alice Cooper tour shirt vet...
















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#### **Northern Colorado** Remembers **Nancy Lorene Sheaffer**

She supported her two girls in anything they wanted to do and was a Girl Scout leader for both, taking them through Brownies to Cadettes and then supporting their efforts in scouting through high school.

She was an avid reader and was active in her book club and had several of her club's book reviews

published. She enjoyed gardening, learning about history, playing with her dogs, eating lunch with her grandkids, and having a free Slurpee on her 7-11 birthday. She moved to Fort Collins and became a member of First United Methodist Church and especially enjoyed the music program. Her retirement was happy with no early morning meetings, lots of free time, and surrounded by her two children and five grandchildren. She overcame a lot to raise her family, was much loved by all, and will be missed.

#### **Coloradans Encouraged to Prepare** for Wildfire as Risk Increases

Colorado is experiencing a new normal for wildfires with several destructive, record-setting fires occurring over the past two years driven by extreme weather and drought. With ongoing drought and warming temperatures across the state continuing to elevate wildfire risk for many Coloradans, state and federal agencies that manage wildfires and forests are urging residents to join in efforts to reduce that risk.

The Colorado Division of Fire Prevention and Control anticipates above-average temperatures and below-average precipitation from now into June. That will result in the persistence and expansion of drought conditions across the state and the emergence of above average, significant fire potential over the eastern portions of Colorado this spring. Continuation of the warm and dry conditions is expected to result in drought intensification and earlier than average spring snowpack runoff, leading to above-normal large fire potential expanding across southern Colorado in May and throughout most of Colorado by June.

"Wildfire season is a thing of the past - it is a year-round battle. Colorado's core fire season is now an average of 78 days longer than it was in the '70s," said DFPC Director Mike Morgan.

The Forest Service recommends the following wildfire preparation activities:

- Rake and remove pine needles and dry leaves 5 feet from the home, as well as under decks, porches, sheds, and play structures.
- Remove leaves and needles from roofs and gutters.
- Sweep porches and decks clear of any burnable plant material.
- Move firewood piles at least 30 feet from the house, preferably uphill.
- · Transfer items under decks or porches to a storage
- Cover any exposed eave or attic vents with 1/8-inch metal mesh screening. Ensure home address signs are clearly visible from

## **Northern Colorado Astronauts Arrive** at Space Station

Commander of Crew is a CSU Alum, Joined by Boulder Native

A Colorado State University alumnus made his second trip to the International Space Station, along with the first Black Woman to live on the Space Station.

Kjell Lindgren is commander of the mission, he earned a master's degree in cardiovascular physiology from CSU in 1996. Jessica Watkins, a Boulder native, is mission specialist.

The pair are joined by two others (Bob Hines, pilot and Samantha Cristoforetti, mission specialist) as part of NASA's SpaceX Crew-4 on Freedom.

"This is our fourth crew rotation flight - it's kind of hard to believe," said Steve Stich, manager, Commercial Crew Program, NASA's Johnson Space Center in Houston. "It seems like Demo-2 was just yesterday, and it's exciting to be here. We had a really clean countdown today - the Falcon 9 rocket did great; the Dragon vehicle did great. It was great to see the crew get in. You could tell they were excited to start their flight off."

Launching alongside the crew in the Dragon capsule is an investigation that seeks to restore meaningful vision to people suffering from retinal degenerative diseases like retinitis pigmentosa and macular degeneration. The Protein-Based Artificial Retina Manufacturing experiment tests the manufacturing of artificial retinas or retinal implants in microgravity, where it is expected their production could be optimized.

#### **About Kjell Lindgren**



Dr. Kjell N. Lindgren was selected by NASA in 2009. He spent most of his childhood abroad and returned to

the U.S. to complete his education and earn a Doctorate of Medicine from the University of Colorado. He earned a master's degree in cardiovascular physiology

from CSU in 1996. He is boardcertified in emergency medicine. After serving as the Deputy Crew Surgeon for STS-130 and Expedition 24, he was selected as an astronaut in June 2009 as one of 14 members of the 20th NASA astronaut class. Dr. Lindgren flew on Expedition 44/45 and logged 141 days in space. He participated in two spacewalks and in more than a hundred different scientific experiments. Lindgren is currently serving as commander on NASA's SpaceX Crew-4 mission to the International Space Station, which launched on April 27.

#### **About Jessica Watkins**



Jessica Watkins was selected by NASA to join the 2017 Astronaut Candidate Class. Watkins reported for duty in

August 2017 and completed two years of training as an astronaut candidate. The Colorado native earned a Bachelor of Science in Geological and Environmental Sciences from Stanford University, and a Doctorate in Geology from the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA). Dr. Watkins conducted her graduate research on the emplacement mechanisms of large landslides on Mars and Earth. She has worked at NASA's Ames Research Center and NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory, and was a science team collaborator for NASA's Mars Science Laboratory rover, Curiosity. Watkins is currently serving as a mission specialist on NASA's SpaceX Crew-4 mission to the International Space Station, which launched on April 27.

#### Scientific Research in Space

Lindgren said one of the scientific experiments the crew is conducting on this mission involves examining how weightlessness affects wound healing in a rodent

model, "which brings me back to my CSU days as well, given CSU's reputation as a veterinary training center." He said the crew will also be growing edible plants, as he did on his last mission.

"And that is an amazing thing, to plant it, then to watch it grow to the size that it can be harvested, to recognize that this could be a really important part of space flight as a source of food and even as part of our environmental control system," he said. "To see a little part of what science fiction has described for a long time ... and then to have that as part of a meal was a lot of fun."

Lindgren acknowledged that he has more responsibility and pressure serving as commander of this mission compared to his first trip to space, but he said his crewmates are fantastic. This marks the first trip to the space station for Boulder native Watkins and American pilot Hines. It is the second mission for European Space Agency astronaut Cristoforetti of Italy.

**Docking at ISS** 



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
