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## Planting for 2080

Increasingly, gardeners in Northern Colorado are faced with a dilemma: unpredictable weather significantly limits our plant palette, particularly due to drought and cold events. While climate change will increase the average temperature in our region, it won't alleviate these abrupt swings in temperature. Under a current high-emission scenario, the Front Range is predicted to end up with a climate analogous to that of the Oklahoma Panhandle by 2080.

So, if we are likely to end up in a grow zone warmer and with average temperatures seven degrees above our current norm, how do we plan(t) for such a future? After all, the woody plant choices we make this year could remain for 80 years to come, but only if well-suited to their environments!

Perhaps the simplest way to get a baseline for such a future would be to examine what currently grows well in the Oklahoma panhandle. On a trip to the area last year, I observed some plants I expected to see, like Celtis spp.(hackberries) and Gleditsia triacanthos (honey locust). To my surprise, Ulmus americana (American elm) individuals were adaptable and tough, too, succeeding in many towns in the area. Prosopis glandulosa (honey mesquite), a new plant to me, was present in both tree and shrub forms. A tough and attractive plant in the bean family bearing fine-textured foliage, the Panhandle represents the northern extent of its range. While currently not hardy enough to survive long-term in Fort Collins, it may be on the menu in the coming years. Selecting individuals from the northern edge of the honey mesquite range (with maximum cold tolerance for the species) could help to bring the species to our market sooner. Such work will be essential in our future of unknowns and possibilities!

A variety of oak (Quercus) species were unfazed by the harshness of the Panhandle; notably, a variety of shrubby oaks, including Q. gambellii (Gambel's), Q. grisea (gray), Q. havardii (Havard's), Q. x undulata (wavyleaf). A number


of tree-form oaks thrived, as well, including Q. macrocarpa (bur), Q. stellata (post oak) and Q. marilandica (blackjack oak). The latter two are rarely seen growing on the Front Range - so far!

Many woody plants we routinely choose for landscapes here on the Front Range - especially native plants - like Rhus aromatica (three-leaf sumac), Artemisia spp. (various sagebrushes) and Juniperus spp. (including J. virginiana, Eastern red cedar), excel in both locales, indicating they will likely remain reliable choices for our landscapes. With any luck, a few exceptionally garden-worthy plants native to our south, like Chilopsis linearis (desert willow), will become more appropriate for our area, too. Already marginally hardy in Northern Colorado, they have naturalized on roadsides adjacent to the Oklahoma Panhandle, demonstrating impressive cold tolerance to accompany the dashing good looks they serve all season long.

So, while coming years will force a change in our plant palette, it's reasonable to hope that the change won't be all bad. After all, change in this world seems to be the only constant!

# **Exciting New Project Planned for Wellington**

WELLINGTON CSC BEGINS FUND RAISING

Grace Village, a faith-based 501-©-3 non-profit organization established by Wellington's Zion Lutheran Church has a dream – to create a Resource Center where people with many kinds of need can find assistance and a hand up to help them through challenging times.

Pastor Mark Gabbart spoke at the Church recently telling members of the Wellington Area Chamber of Commerce about plans to make their dream a reality. Its mission is to connect its neighbors with uplifting, encouraging, and lifeenhancing resources.

As they enter the fund-raising phase of the project, they need to raise a \$1.4 million dollars to erect a building to house the Resource Center. It will be built on land the church already owns and which has been used as a Community Garden for many years.

Their research shows that the need is great with nearly 11% of Larimer County Residents now living

at or below the Federal Poverty Guidelines, 38,000 residents are food-insecure and 32% of schoolaged children receive free or reduced-priced meals. Over 700 residents of Wellington had income below the poverty level in 2019. Many live without health insurance. These are desperate needs that need to be addressed. They are youth, children, seniors, the disabled, veterans, formerly middle class, and on the brink of homelessness.

The exciting parts of this Center are the fact that it will house the Wellington Food Bank, allowing it to be open for "shopping" many more days than are currently available. The Center has commitments from Larimer County Human Services and Summitstone Health Partners to have offices in the building. They are working to add a clothing bank, Children's Speech and Reading Center, Counseling and Mental Health Services, Income Tax, and Financial Assistance Offices. They will provide space for community groups and youth activities, educational support services, and a place where groups of people can come just to talk.

Their fund-raising strategy is to secure 100% of the funding necessary to construct the 4,800-square-foot building which is already designed. They also aim to raise \$250,000 to fund start-up expenses and initial operating costs. They will not use any borrowed money and intend to operate all programs with ongoing fund-raising efforts.

By supporting the campaign for this Community Service Center, you will support the entire community of Wellington. You can help break the chains of poverty that hold so many people back. They offer online giving, writing a check, or purchasing a commemorative brick that will allow your name to be forever displayed on the property.

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
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
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# **Xcel Energy Starts Natural Gas** Construction

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Xcel Energy crews are working on the Grant Avenue Natural Gas Project. This work allows Xcel Energy to continue to provide safe, reliable natural gas service and enhances natural gas system resiliency to extreme weather events.

Work will start near Cherry Street and Grant Avenue and proceed south along Grant Avenue toward Mulberry Street. Crews will be on-site preparing for the start of construction by marking and visually locating underground utility lines and delivering materials and equipment to work areas. Natural gas line installation is expected to begin on June 13. Construction will also take place on Mulberry Street, between Grant Avenue and Shields Street, later this year.

Traffic control measures, including lane shifts and parking restrictions, will be in place. Reduced speed limits will be enforced in work areas. Access to homes and businesses will be maintained, but some short-term closures may be needed for the safety of the public and our crews.

Construction is expected to continue through fall 2022. Schedules are subject to change due to weather and other factors.

# County Residents Encouraged to Participate in Health Survey

The region's longest-running community health survey is now underway, and local residents are encouraged to let their voices be heard.

Approximately 13,000 randomly selected households in Larimer County have begun receiving letters inviting them to participate in the 2022 Community Health Survey conducted by the Health District of Northern Larimer County. Participants can complete the survey online through a secure website or by filling out a printed survey booklet.

Survey questions cover topics such as physical and mental health status and needs, health behaviors, neighborhoods and environments, caregiving burden, and views on local policies. Other questions measure some of the impacts of the pandemic, social support structures, housing, emergency preparedness, and more.

Responses to the survey will help the Health District better understand the health, and healthcare needs, of area residents. Information gathered will guide the planning and design of programs and services at the Health District. Results also will be made available to other local agencies and organizations working on health-related issues. All responses are completely confidential. The Health District keeps no personal information on individual participants.

Some key findings from the last Community Health Survey in 2019:

- Nearly a quarter of survey respondents (24%) thought they needed to cut down on their drinking or drug use.
- The percentage of respondents who reported drinking and driving doubled, from 4% in 2016 to 9% in 2019.
- Rates of cigarette smoking hit an all-time low of 5%, down from 19% in the first survey in 1995.
- Those who reported having depression, anxiety,

- or other mental health issues increased from 21% in 2016 to
- · 30% in 2019.
- Local obesity rates remained stable at 16% and continued to be lower than the state (23%) or national (42%) rates.
- Finding childcare was difficult, with 57% of respondents reporting having "a lot" or "some" finding difficulty with the type of care they needed.

The survey is part of the Health District's periodic Community Health Assessment, which also will include a series of public forums later this year where residents can express their opinions on health-related topics.

The Health District has conducted a Community Health Assessment every three years since 1995, making it the longest-running project of its kind in northern Colorado and unique among communities of a similar size.

Approximately 2,500 county residents took the last survey in 2019. Partial support for this year's survey comes from the Larimer County Department of Health and Environment, North Colorado Health Alliance, and the City of Loveland.

Baseline plans to offer the Finley rental townhome in Parkside West located east of Sheridan Boulevard. The Finley floor plan averages just under 1,400 square feet and is anticipated to open in early 2023. A second build-to-rent home option, the Grayson floor plan, averaging 1,800 square feet is anticipated to be available in late 2023.

Baseline serves as Colorado's first Pollinator District™ and is prominently located at the junction of I-25, Northwest Parkway (E-470), and Highway 7/Baseline Road in Broomfield. Baseline is quickly evolving as a new economic mixed-use community that completes the Denver/Boulder triangle. McWhinney's development plans call for approximately 9,200 home options and up to 8 million square feet of commercial at full build-out.

Additional amenities spread across the communities are planned to include outdoor spaces and game courts, barbeque and picnic areas, spajacuzzies, bike rooms, and conference rooms.

# Trust for Public Land Awarded \$1.5M GOCO Grant to Permanently Protect Working Land in Larimer County

Recently the Great Outdoors Colorado (GOCO) board awarded a \$1,500,000 grant to Trust for Public Land (TPL) to acquire a 226-acre farm and its water rights adjacent to the Little Thompson River near Berthoud. The property will be protected via a conservation easement immediately prior to TPL's acquisition and continue operations as a working farm with an added focus on educational opportunities in partnership with agricultural and youth organizations. The grant is part of GOCO's Land Acquisition program, which supports urban and rural landscape, waterway, and habitat protection priorities across Colorado.

The easement will be held by the Colorado Cattlemen's Agricultural Land Trust (CCALT), and the property will be owned and managed by the Colorado Future Farmers of America Foundation (Colorado FFA Foundation).

"As Colorado continues to grow at an unprecedented rate with increased pressure on our limited land and water resources, it is critical that all Coloradoans understand the importance of working agriculture to our state. This project will play a critical role in illustrating how rural and urban communities benefit from land and water conservation, ensuring that our state continues to be a great place to live and visit," said Wade Shelton, senior project manager at TPL.

The Colorado FFA Foundation will operate the site as an immersive agricultural experience for youth and the public along Colorado's Front Range in collaboration with traditional agricultural youth organizations like 4-H and Colorado Future Farmers of America while broadening their reach and collaboration with organizations like the Boys and Girls Club, Scouts, Thompson

and St. Vrain School Districts, CAM's Ag Academy at Colorado State University (CSU) College of Agricultural Sciences, CSU Spur Campus, Groundwork Colorado, and Environmental Learning for Kids, to name a few. These opportunities will illustrate the value of land and water conservation to the public.

"Our Foundation is extremely excited to be a part of this project and expand our mission to offer educational opportunities for people to learn hands-on about agriculture," said Don Thorn, executive director of the Colorado FFA Foundation.

GOCO funds will be matched by \$2.625 million from the Natural Resource Conservation Service, \$280,000 from Larimer County Open Space, and \$50,000 from Gates Family Foundation, and will also be supported by an ongoing private fundraising effort led by the Colorado FFA Foundation in collaboration with TPL and CCALT.



## Recommended: Classic Movies, Live Music

I've taken a radical turn in my screen-watching habits. I have, temporarily, completely stopped streaming current TV and movies.

Instead, I have been delving back into the past to find some excellent viewing. I don't mean the recent past, like last year -- I mean going way back.

Here are some of the classic movies I have recently

King of Hearts (1967) - This is a mindful comedy about a WWI Scottish soldier tasked with defusing a bomb in a French town being evacuated by Germans forces. He gets spotted by retreating Germans and when he takes refuge inside the town's insane asylum, a relationship begins with the inmates that can only be described as odd.

The inmates spill out of the asylum when the town is abandoned by both the Germans and the other residents, and they create their own world, or "theatre" as one character puts it. The soldier unwittingly becomes their

Despite the kind of slapstick nature of the action, there is a sophisticated line of thought here -- like questioning whether the "crazy" people are as crazy as the "normal" people who are fighting a bloody war close by.

The most poignant scene in the movie comes when the soldier tries to lead everybody out of town to "safety". As he rides a horse through the city gates and out into the world, the others all fall behind. The "crazy people"

plead with the soldier to come back and one of them calls after him: "There are wild beasts out there". The boom of cannon in the background underscores that truth.

Movie Classics- Fantastic Planet

Fantastic Planet (1973) - This animated science fiction classic may seem clunky at first, the art especially simplistic considering the astounding things that are being done today with digital graphics. But don't let that put you off -- there are some weighty concepts going on here.

On another world, human beings do not dominate. Instead, they are small creatures that are often domesticated as pets for the giant race of blue people who do dominate -- or are exterminated as pests.


The tables are switched on us here and there are lessons to be learned about being treated with little or no deference, even at the hands of more or less enlightened beings.

That's the storyline, but this relatively short feature -- 68 minutes -- is jammed with some alluring stuff

-- like a peculiar meditation practice by the blue people that sends their minds to another planet. Weird beasts, strange plants, and exotic landscapes all provide a mindtwisting background.

# ALYSIA KRAFT'S DAZZLING DEBUT ALBUM SHARES THE HUMAN EXPERIENCE IN INDIE-POP FORM

Alysia Kraft's debut album First Light is a carefully crafted montage of life's most brilliant and mundane moments. Out on June 24, Kraft brings quiet introspection, vivid imagery, and evocative lyricism to paint the picture of her life so far.

Capturing these moments with dreamy indie-pop instrumentation, the record shares everything from finding love, to almost losing life, and the wondrous occasions in between. The album came about during quarantine in 2020. Kraft recalls creating art at the break of dawn, or better put, the First Light of the morning.

"By the time dawn was pouring colors onto her palette, I was mixing them in mine – trying to stay in touch with the joy of being alive by writing, recalling, making demos," she says. This free-flowing creativity seems to inform the feel of the record as she creates the essence of billowing in the wind, romanticizing reflective moments and flickering through elife's highlights with candid ease.


"I wrote from the big moments of my life," she explains. "The first time I kissed a girl and felt like my body could not contain the magic and life and electricity within me. The first time I celebrated a full year sober and realized I was free to be a new person if I really wanted to be. The wild, uninhibited joy of my first tours.

intoxicated by travel and connection and possibility and dizzied by the distance from my family." Finding inspiration in the nature around her, Kraft adds that, "in the midst of conjuring these events from the past, 2020 shed few quiet moments of new understanding – personified and almost always delivered by the Wyoming landscape that raised me."

Drawing from her life might make the record seem narrow but in fact, it's Kraft's brilliant storytelling that invites listeners to find similarities in their own lives and reflect on them just as deeply. Tracks like "Small Town Lights" share a coming-of-age story with a 17-year-old Kraft experiencing the thrill of teenagedom. Then there's "Hamilton Pool," a deeply romantic and authentic recounting of the first time Kraft met her true love.

"Little River," tells the story of the day in which the singer-songwriter almost drowned and how she's moved forward from the fear.

As she sings, the image of Kraft writing music in the light of the morning isn't hard to picture. Vacant lots, empty storefronts, psychic windowpanes, the sound of silence ignites. It's a lonesome good night," she sings, adding "A bird doesn't sing because it's got the answer. A bird sings because it's got a song."



Rowing in the Inlet Bay Marina of Larimer County's beautiful Horsetooth Reservoir, the NoCo Crew consists of four seasons: winter season conditioning and three competitive seasons with a goal of qualifying for Youth Nationals. Spring season (Sprints), summer season (Sprints), and Fall Season (Head Racing). NoCo competes in a number of local Colorado races, as well as regional and nationally renowned regattas, and registration, as well as participation, are for each distinct Spring, Summer, or Fall season program. In addition, NoCo Rowers are allowed to participate in all or any one specific season.

"It's a blast! It's a lot harder than people think but it's a lot of fun to try and get competent at this skill; you get to glide like you're a surfer and you get to bust your hump like you're a cross-country ski racer. It's very challenging, kind of technical, but it's pretty fun from the get-go. It's the ultimate team sport," Mark said. "Give it a try and I hope it grabs you because it truly is a sport for a lifetime and it's definitely a great way to get you really fit."

But then, all of the attendees were invited to file outside to witness Military Honors performed by a local Honor Guard. My uncle had served in the Navy and that was a point of pride in his life.

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

# Northern Colorado's Workforce Shortage

Are you looking for a job? If you are then you're certainly in luck because Larimer County has no shortage of them to offer; a shortage of jobs isn't the problem at all, it's having a shortage of people to fill them that's the problem. According to the United States Federal Reserve, Larimer County unemployment rate is at 2.60%, compared to 3.10% last month and 5.30% last year. This is said to be overall lower than the long-term average of 4.33%.

Fort Collins Chamber of Commerce President & CEO Ann Hutchison recently wrote a blog outlining the latest detailed look at unemployment all throughout Northern Colorado; the data was compiled in collaboration with Alexander Research & Consulting and the Economic Tracker found at NoCoRecovers.com. It clearly shows the current state of unemployment is considered to be "full employment" and Northern Colorado is considered to be making continual progress towards recovery, so the question then becomes why are so many employers having such a hard time finding workers to fill these vast positions?

- Northern Colorado continues to make progress towards recovery even as, nationally, worries of another recession loom on the horizon.
- The unemployment rate is well within what is considered full employment. The unemployment rate has dipped below 3% in Larimer County and is at 3.4% in Weld County.
- The civilian labor force in the region is larger than it was, on average, in 2019.
- Although the number of unique job postings fell in April, it is more than double its 2019 average.
   Regionwide, there are three job postings for every unemployed worker, a sign of a very tight labor market.
- In Larimer County, the number of jobs is 2.4 percent above the 2019 average while in Weld County, it is 4.7% below. Mining, Logging, and Construction is the sector that has gained the most jobs in Larimer County but has lost the most jobs in Weld County. Leisure & Hospitality, Professional & Business Services, and Retail Trade are the big winners in terms of job growth. State Government (in particular Educational Services) and Information are the big losers.
- Average Hourly Earnings continue to climb in Larimer County but have remained flat in Weld County since the initial decline in 2020.
- Retail Sales continue to rise in both counties, which is a reflection of both sales volume and rising prices.

Adam Crowe, an Economic Development Manager with Larimer County Economic & Workforce Development, says that while the pandemic and the "Great Resignation" have made clear contributions to a shortage of available employees, it doesn't answer for the majority of the problem and, in fact, it's actually a problem the entire country has seen coming decades before the pandemic even happened.

the pandemic even happened.

"It's a very complex situation[...]it's really a generational and demographic issue at its heart.

When we look at the different generations, our

baby boomers, even the youngest of them, are

retiring and many of them are choosing not to come back to the workforce."

As Adam explained, often in the past when people would retire, they would still return to the workforce at least on a part-time basis to some extent, taking the edge off of most labor needs, but after COVID one of the changes the nation is now seeing is that many people who are retiring are simply doing just that and not returning to work in any capacity; it's an issue that Adam says is COVID related but more so a long-term demographic challenge that trickles down with each generation

"If we look at our next generation, (Generation X), they are one of the smaller generations that we have, which means they're one of the smaller generations in the workforce[...]And then if we look at our millennials, which would be our next generation, there aren't as many millennials as there are baby boomers, but they're still learning and they're still building skills and there's simply not enough of them to fill the gap that is being left by our largest generation[...]When we talk about the term that was being used a decade ago, the 'Silver Tsunami' when we started to see people retire, we're feeling the effects of that and this is the outcome of the fact that we have a demographic shift where we have more people leaving the workforce than people coming into it and it really has to do with age more than anything," Adam

Because of this generational gap, it's likely that Colorado along with many other states throughout the country will continue to see a labor shortage, which is why it's now more important than ever for businesses to be adaptable and find ways to still exist within this newer economic climate, which Adam says is achieved by companies being willing to ask hard questions of themselves. For instance, how do companies make themselves more competitive in the job market and overall more attractive to employees, how can companies think about restructuring if they're not able to find the workers needed, and lastly, if possible and the specific industry allows for it, how can moves be made towards automation as an option.


Luckily resources such as the Larimer County Workforce & Development exist because they're in a unique position to not only help companies answer those very types of questions, but also help assist those employees who for whatever reason might be struggling to find their right fit.

displayed it, then refolded it with a solemn, silent purposefulness and care. The flag was then presented to my aunt as a token of thanks for my uncle's service.

The way these Honor Guard members performed their duty was so perfectly focused and seriously accomplished -without a hint of hesitation. It reached deep into my heart. I cannot express just how touching and even inspirational this experience was.

I am so thankful for that.

My trip back to Colorado was uneventful, passing through the busy Minneapolis airport and wading through the crowds at the ultra-busy Denver airport, finally returning to Fort Collins with a warm satisfaction that my uncle had been honored beautifully.

That was on June 9.

The next morning I opened my usual round of news sites to catch up on what had been happening in the world -- the calmness of staying on a gorgeous lakefront in Wisconsin and warmly interacting with relatives still circulating in my mind. And then what I saw took over like a tornado of

On June 10, the news was flooded with articles and videos covering the first public hearing from the United States House Select Committee on the January 6 Attack. I was quickly sobered by the text I was reading. Then my tears came back when I viewed videos of the event.

I saw Americans viciously and angrily

pummeling other Americans -- pushing, punching, hitting, stabbing, screaming, and wreaking destruction on our capitol. It made

This was the exact opposite of what I experienced at my uncle's remembrance service a few days earlier. And it made me ask myself -- what would my uncle think about this? What would my late father -also a Navy veteran -- think of this? What about my Vietnam War veteran friend, a Marine Lieutenant, who passed away last December due to CO-VID think?

Many years ago, I heard the late Desmond Tutu speak at Moby Arena at CSU. And he said the only road to peace had to be in accepting "all", making "all" welcome to the table. How do we create a society that accepts "all" including those people who fought on the Capitol steps?

January 6. School shootings. Racial hatred. So much more. What are we doing to ourselves? How do we survive this extreme turbulence?

I ask questions but have no answers.

I might not have hope for the future if I hadn't witnessed my uncle's Military Honors. There I saw a solemnity and grace that paid true honor to a man who was proud of serving his country.

American honor still has a place in the

The American dishonor I saw in those January 6 videos reminds me that we still have a long way to go.
